English:

Refer to your Revision and Homework Schedule provided by your class teacher – complete the homework tasks and revision expectations for Language and Literature.

Maths:

Maths students should use their PLCs to practice the suggested exam questions, checking their answers after each question.

Science:

Use your revision guides and the 15 week plan to revise the topic areas identified in Biology, Chemistry and Physics, this revision work is to be shown to your teacher on a fortnightly basis. In addition to this, students should be practicing past paper questions, which can be found by following the QR code.





Geography:

Use your revision guide to produce graphic organisers/flash cards (homework) and to help you answer past paper questions. Know your case studies (examples).

Philosophy and Ethics:

Weekly home work questions to Mr Cloves and AQA Religious Studies A past papers – the more you do the more Mr Cloves will mark!

History:

History students should make use of Seneca and their revision guides to keep up to date on revision. Remember, little and often is the best way to remember things.





Art:

Students have two projects to complete. Details are on class charts. Intervention sessions are also available at lunchtime and after school.

French:

Students should use their sentence builder booklets provided to write out general conversation question answers in their red books and should be memorising the answers already completed. They should also learn the PALM W sheet to support them in answering Photo Card questions.





Design & Technology:

NEA coursework: Use your progress RAG sheets to complete each section of your NEA coursework. Intervention sessions are available, please speak to your class teacher.

Written exam: Use your topic booklets to produce flashcards and answer past exam questions.



Form time and P6



- Students have been identified for Maths **or** English **or** Science intervention during form time. This is both targeted and compulsory.
- All these sessions have been informed by mock exam data interrogation and student needs.



Year 11 revision strategies



- Everyone revises in different ways and subjects often require different approaches to revision.
- You will need to work out what works best for you if you already haven't.
- You will also need to identify the best place/environment for you to revise allowing you to concentrate.



How long should I revise for?

PAKEFIELD

- You should be revising for approximately 2-hours a day.
- In most subjects, homework will have a revision/recall focus.
- Avoid revising for longer than 60-minutes at a time.
 Chunk this into 3 x 20-minute slots.
- Take a break in between sessions.



Other advice



- Avoid having your mobile phone out when revising so that you are not distracted.
- Additionally, avoid going on your phone immediately before bedtime.



Key words with succinct defintions.




Effective use of revision guide to consolidate information.

Where can I find past papers and how do I use them?

Where?

- Exam board websites have all past papers available to everyone (apart from the most recent).
- To search for them, type the subject, exam board and past papers into Google. E.g. 'Geography Edexcel B past paper'.
- You will also find the mark schemes which are helpful.

How?

- Write down the question and look at the marks available.
- Either attempt the question without supporting resources or with – either way, you are applying knowledge to the command of the question.
- Use the mark scheme to check your answer.
- Ask your teacher to look at them.




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


What are revision workbooks?



- Workbooks are different from revision guides – they contain questions and activities to promote recall.
- Most subjects have several to available from different publishers.
- Check with your teacher if you are going to buy one so it is the right exam board and most useful.

What is a graphic organiser?

Below is an example of a graphic organiser. This could be done in a note-book or on a series of flashcards. Again, it uses images and key terms.



Define it – in the upper course, most erosion is vertical, creating a step that eventually leads to a waterfall.

Waterfall

Linking words: vertical erosion, abrasion, hydraulic action, plunge pool, gorge.

Use it – waterfalls occur when a river crosses a bed of more resistant rock, eroding the less resistant rock beneath.

Create a revision timetable and plan specifically what you are going to revise.

What to include in your revision timetable



- 1. Write in your non-negotiables e.g. exam dates, work, clubs.
- 2. Identify the topics in your subjects you need to prioritise.
- 3. Start detailing your revision plans e.g. subject and topic, duration, method (past paper question, flash cards, online quizzing).
- 4. Having planned in advance, have the necessary resources such as revision guides and past papers ready.
- 5. Plan rewards and treats.
